- » Fast of Esther (March 20 AM / 13 Adar II): The day before Purim, the 13th of Adar, or Thursday, March 20, is a fast day, the Fast of Esther. The fast starts 6:17 AM and ends 8:19 PM.
- » Mitzvos of Purim (March 20 PM-21 AM / 14 Adar II): The four main mitzvos of the day are: 1) Megillah: Listening to the public reading, usually in synagogue, of the Book of Esther in the evening and again in the following morning. 2) Mishloach Manos: Sending food gifts to friends. 3) Matanos L'Evyonim: Giving gifts to the poor (matanos l'evyonim). 4) Eating a festive meal (seudas mitzvah). 1) Megillah: Listen to every word as the whole story of Purim is read from a hand-written scroll of parchment called a Megillah. The megillah is read once on Purim eve and a second time the next morning, Purim day. Men, women and children who are able to listen to pay attention are obligated to attend both times.
 2) Mishloach Manos: Send a gift of at least two ready to eat foodtypes to at least one friend on Purim to be given on Purim day. Men send to men and women send to women. 3) Matanos L'Evyonim: Give a monetary or food gift to at least two poor people. This must

be distributed on Purim directly to the needy. Rabbi Rich will be collecting this money and can be your agent for this mitzvah, if you like. Money will be distributed to local needy in our community. **4) Eating Festive Meal:** Because Purim is Erev Shabbos, one should wash for a meal before chatzos (midday), 1:35 AM Purim day. There will be a Purim seudah in the shul. Everyone is invited. A sign-up form and details will be arriving via the website at the beginning of next week. The cost will be \$7/person or \$25/family.

■ AHAVAS CHESED (LOVING KINDNESS) BY THE CHOFETZ CHAIM:

Reuven walks down the street, preoccupied with his mountain of financial woes. "If someone could just loan me a thousand dollars..." he thinks.

Shimon, a prominent businessman, is walking up the street. As the two men approach each other, Reuven lifts his gaze from the concrete and recognizes his old friend. An inspiration suddenly lightens his heart: Maybe Shimon would help me out."

At this moment, Shimon has the opportunity to perform a direct commandment of the Torah. "When you lend money to My people, to the poor person who is with you, do not act toward him as a creditor; do not lay interest upon him," says Shemos (22:24). Just as the Torah commands a Jew to hang a mezuzah on his doorpost, or bless a lulav and esrog or eat matzah, it mandates the loaning of money to those in need. The mitzvah is a gift—a means Hashem has given mortal man to serve Him and earn the eternal rewards that it brings.

One might think, then, that Shimon would pull out his check-book with a joyous smile and write a check on the spot. It would seem that his heart should be as full and proud as it is when he writes a \$300 check for a choice esrog. He doesn't grumble about the expense then; he relishes it.

The mitzvah of loaning money, however, elicits no joy from Shimon, and that is because he falls within the next of the Chofetz Chaim's categories in the verse. "The lazy one shall be wounded." The next letters, "hei" and "yud," represent "helem yediah," an absence of knowledge. This person rests upon the belief that giving is a "nice thing" for nice people to do but certainly not an obligation. If he finds a loan request inconvenient or uncomfortable, he feels free to exempt himself, something he would never do if the same obstacles were to come between him and a "real mitzvah."

Such a person might say. "I don't have any cash on me today. Why don't you come by my office tomorrow and I'll see what I can do." He thereby leaves the person to wallow in his troubles, unsure of how much help he will receive, certain only that he must make yet another humiliating appearance, yet another request.

If Shimon understood the nature of his obligation, he would greet Reuven as the bearer of a wonderful opportunity. He would feel an urgency to do the mitzvah, no matter what the logistical problems might be. Rather than delivering an excuse, he would act as if Erev Succos had arrived and he needed to buy s'chach at the only outlet in town, which was about to close. There's no doubt that, in that case, Shimon would run to the store: "Can you stay open for just another half-hour while I get some money out of the bank?" He would race to the bank, race back to the store and bring the s'chach home with the appearance of a conquering hero.

Someone who sees chesed in its true light, who does not fall victim to "helem yediah," offers his help with just such energy and focus. His climb over the logistical obstacles is not draining, but revitalizing. In his drive to get the job done, he finds joy and purpose. The Chofetz Chaim cites Mishlei (21:21), which makes the case:
